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Nashville Songwriters Hall Of Fame Event Centers On Big Stars And Bigger Inspiration

The Nashville Songwriters Hall of Fame induction on Oct. 11 was populated by stars, including new members Keith Urban and Kix Brooks, presenter Dolly Parton and performers Eric Church and Kenny Chesney.

But one of the most inspiring pieces of the evening revolved around a songwriter, John Jarrard ("Blue Clear Sky," "Money in the Bank"), who wasn't even in the room. The night's

first recipient, recognized as a legacy inductee, Jarrard's remarkable story was recounted by a former co-writer, presenter Gary Nicholson ("The Trouble With the Truth," "Working Without a Net"), and widow Janet Jarrard. Diagnosed with diabetes at age 12, John lost his sight a year after his move to Nashville, battled through the resulting depression and became one of the city's most determined

successes. He fit his songwriting sessions around four-hour dialysis appointments and psychotherapy, and frequently dismissed offers of a ride home, instead navigating some of Music City's busiest streets on foot using his cane, his hearing and his self-reliance.


Jarrard's life philosophy, Nicholson recalled, was "Keep on walkin'," and even after enduring organ transplants and the loss of limbs and digits, he was a force in the songwriting community, penning nearly 20 country hits. BlackHawk delivered one of those tunes — "I Sure Can Smell the Rain," a title that carries extra heft for a songwriter who couldn't see - with impeccable three-part harmony. It took more than 22 years after Jarrard's death until he finally received his induction, and some of the attendees were young enough that they were not aware of his contribution. His story was so compelling that people


> could be heard even after the ceremony - three hours after his segment in the program admiring Jarrard's tenacity.

> 'We all need inspiring stories," Janet said prior to the event at the Music City Center, finding purpose in the wait for his induction. "There's a whole new generation of people in the music business who didn't know him, and now I'm privileged enough to be able to share a little bit about what he accomplished in spite of the

things that he went through. So in my estimation, it's kind of the right time."

Jarrard joined the Hall alongside Casey Beathard ("Don't Blink," "How 'Bout Them Cowgirls"), Rafe Van Hoy ("Golden Ring," "What's Forever For"), David Lee Murphy ("Big Green Tractor," "Are You Gonna Kiss Me or Not"), plus Brooks and \(\Sigma\) Urban, whose entrance marked the first time he has been enshrined in a Hall of Fame.





"The writing one's crazy because I think of **Kris Kristofferson** and **John Prine, Townes Van Zandt** as writer-poets—and I don't come from that place," Urban said before the ceremony. "But I love that. I think for the longest time I didn't even see myself as a writer because I don't write like that."

Church honored Urban's induction by reworking his upbeat anthem "Who Wouldn't Wanna Be Me" as a spare, spiky contemplation. Church also performed "Like Jesus Does" — with an evangelistic second verse by **Joanna Cotten** — to usher Beathard into the ranks. Church hailed Beathard "as a North star for me as a writer. He's an even better person."

In his acceptance speech and a preshow conversation, Beathard outlined the unpredictability and synchronicity involved in his relocation to Tennessee and in his emergence as a writer. He also noted the death of a son and the higher understanding of a songwriters' role he has since discovered.

"You move here for yourself—I did," he said on the red carpet. "You meet a wife, you have a family, and you start realizing life is bigger than you. And so you get that to carry into a room or to write about, and then it becomes, 'Man, I've had some success, but there's got to be more.' So then it becomes, 'Man, just pay attention in these rooms.' What am I doing if I'm not paying attention to the guy or girl I'm writing with and we can't share something? I can encourage 'em, give 'em hope and talk about stuff, and put something out there that might give somebody life."

Van Hoy's induction was accompanied by John Conlee's spot-on version of ``Lady Lay Down," a 1979 song that preceded two other Van Hoy compositions that became Conlee hits: "Friday Night Blues" and "I'm Only in It for the Love."

"If my life was cake," Van Hoy said, "most of it would be icing."

Chesney sang Murphy's road warrior song "Living in Fast Forward" prior to his induction. Murphy marveled before the dinner how the best songs survive in people's minds as time moves forward.

"You might spend your whole life writing songs," he said, "and then one night, one song falls out that touches people in a way that you didn't know was going to happen, and it all comes together. And then you have a song that people sing in bowling alleys and dive bars across the country, and they're songs that stay in our lives."

Brooks' induction came four years after his duo, **Brooks & Dunn**, was added to the Country Music Hall of Fame. **Cody Johnson** performed an acoustic version of "Only in America" as a lead-in, and Brooks admitted he was more at home with the songwriters recognition than he had been when he made the Country Hall.

"It's still kind of unreal to me to be in the Rotunda," he said on the red carpet. "This is why I came here — to write songs, you know. Not to have a piece of bronze up there next to **Hank Williams**."

That said, the Songwriters Hall also places him in a club with Williams, not to mention **Willie Nelson**, **Loretta Lynn** and Parton, who shared his view of songwriting as the center of her creativity.

"With everything I've done," she said while inducting Urban, "if I had to give it all up and just keep one thing, I'd be a songwriter." •

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
'Can't' Can: Dylan Scott Earns Fifth Country Airplay Top 10

Dylan Scott earns his fifth top 10 on *Billboard*'s Country Airplay chart as "Can't Have Mine" (Curb) rises 11-9 in its 56th week on the ranking (dated Oct. 21). It increased by 8% to 19.8 million audience impressions during the

Oct. 6-12 tracking week, according to Luminate.

Scott co-authored the song with Matt Alderman, Josh Melton and Dallas Wilson. It's from his LP Livin' My Best Life, which arrived at its No. 12 high on Top Country Albums in August 2022.

"Can't Have Mine" follows "New Truck," which became the second Country Airplay No. 1 for the 32-year-old Bastrop, La., native in August 2022 when it led for one week. Before that, "Nobody," hit No. 2 in June 2021, "Hooked" climbed to No. 2 in September 2018, and "My Girl," his third of nine entries, led for one frame in July 2017.



Scott is currently on his This Town's Been Too Good to Us Tour with supporting acts **Taylor Holder** and **Matt Schuster**. The next stop is in Atlanta (Oct. 13), followed by Knoxville, Tenn. (Oct. 14).

THIRD ROUND OF 'MOONSHINE' Lainey Wilson's "Watermelon Moonshine" (Broken Bow) dominates Country Airplay for a third week (31 million, up 2%). Her third No. 1 marks her first to rule for three weeks. Her rookie entry, "Things a Man Oughta Know," led for one week in September 2021, and her collaboration with **Cole Swindell**, "Never Say Never," ruled the summit for two frames starting in April 2022.

Meanwhile, "Moonshine" marks the sixth song to dominate Country Airplay for three or more weeks of the 15 titles that have ascended to No. 1 so far in 2023.

RANKINGS

Country Airplay is ranked by total audience impressions for the week ending Sunday based on monitored airplay by Mediabase of 145 stations by Luminate. Audience totals on the chart are derived, in part, using certain Nielsen Audio-copyrighted Persons 12+ audience estimates (under license © 2023, Nielsen Audio). The list of all Country Airplay chart reporters can be viewed in Luminate's online platform.

TIES

On Country Airplay, if two songs are tied in audience, the song with the larger increase in audience is placed first.

BULLETS

Awarded on Country Airplay to titles gaining audience or remaining flat from the previous week. A song will also receive a bullet if its percentage loss in audience does not exceed the percentage of monitored station downtime for the format. Titles that decline in audience but increase in detections will also receive a bullet if the total audience erosion for the week does not exceed 3%.

RECURRENTS

On Country Airplay, descending titles below No. 10 in either audience or detections are moved to recurrent after 20 weeks, provided that they are not still gaining enough audience points to bullet or if they rank below No. 10 and post a third consecutive week of (non-bulleted) audience decline, regardless of total chart weeks. Plus, songs that ascend to a peak between Nos. 1 and 5 will remain on the chart for one additional week even if dropping below No. 10.

HOT SHOT DEBUT

Awarded to the highest-ranking new entry on Country Airplay.

MOST INCREASED AUDIENCE

Most Increased Audience on Country Airplay lists the songs with the greatest week-to-week increases in total audience.

AIRPOWER

Awarded on Country Airplay to titles ranking inside top 20 in plays and audience rankings for the first time, with increases in both plays and audience.

BREAKER

Awarded on Country Airplay to titles achieving airplay (at least one detection) at 60% of reporting stations for the first time.

BEHIND CODY JOHNSON'S LEATHER

The cover art for **Cody Johnson**'s album *Leather*, out Nov. 3 on COJO Music/Warner Music Nashville, features a close-up of the singer's tattooed hands, work-worn and slightly bloodied, gripping a strip of leather.

A former bull rider, the Texan is better known nowadays for his energetic showmanship and his nine-week *Billboard* Hot Country Songs No. 1 "'Til You Can't." But when the 2023 Country Music Association male vocalist of the year nominee isn't making music, Johnson is riding, roping and training horses and raising cattle — as he was the day the album cover was shot.

"I was working at the ranch that day, so I told my photographer, **Chris Douglas**, to come over," Johnson tells *Billboard*. "That's blood and hair in that picture from castrating bulls and giving them shots that day. We didn't stage any of that. We got started at 5 a.m. and worked all day, and he ended up getting some incredible photos while we were working."

The cover image conveys a sense of work ethic, grit and an uncompromising sense of self, all of which are apparent on the 12-song follow-up to 2021's *Human: The Double Album.* As with his previous sets, Johnson's mission wasn't to simply find the best songs, but to record ones that reveal nuances of his own artistry.

"People appreciate authenticity, whether it's me being a cowboy and singing something that reminds people of '90s country stuff they grew up on, or someone like the **Zach Bryans** and guys that are more like what probably is considered Americana, or **Jelly Roll**, who is completely the opposite of me musically," Johnson says. "But authenticity is the common thread."

5 Years Ago Russell Dickerson Rolled To No. 1

In 2018, "Blue Tacoma" became his second of four consecutive Hot Country Songs leaders

On Oct. 13, 2018, Russell Dickerson's "Blue Tacoma" pulled into the No. 1 spot on *Billboard*'s Country Airplay chart. It became his second of four career-opening, and total, leaders on the list.

Dickerson co-penned the song with **Parker Welling** and **Casey Brown**, the latter of whom produced it. The single was released from Dickerson's debut LP, *Yours*, which hit No. 5 on Top

Country Albums. The song followed his debut Country Airplay No. 1, "Yours," and preceded his leaders "Every Little Thing" and "Love You Like I Used To." It also scored a synch in the *X-Men* franchise film *Logan*, starring **Hugh Jackman**.

Now 36, Dickerson, from Union City, Tenn., earned a bachelor's degree in music from Nashville's Belmont University. He signed with Triple Tigers Records in October 2016. Dickerson is currently touring; he will make his next stop on Oct. 26 in Cleveland.

Dickerson's latest single, "God Gave Me a Girl," which he co-wrote, pushes 5-4 on Country Airplay (6.8 million impressions, up 8%, according to Luminate). "I love alliteration," he told Billboard last year of the song, "and my reputation precedes myself as the love song guy."
