Grammys Recognize The Continued Evolution Of Country Music, And Of Nashville Overall

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Country Coda: Tom T. Hall's 'Country Jail' >page 12 Country music will be operating at "cross" purposes with the Recording Academy during the 67th annual Grammy Awards and the streamed Grammys Premiere Ceremony on Feb. 2 in Los Angeles.

Twelve of the 20 nominations in the four country categories belong to artists who, just five years ago, were making music that landed outside of mainstream country: R&B icon Beyoncè, multigenre act Shaboozey, pop artist Post Malone and former Tennessee rapper Jelly Roll.

"Everyone is saying country's bigger than it's ever been," notes songwriter of the year nominee Jessie Jo Dillon ("Messed Up As Me," "Am I Okay?"), "but I think that's because of these people moving into it."

At the same time, talent from the country music capital is on the ballot in other areas that defy traditional stereotypes about Nashville: banjoist **Bèla Fleck** is nominated for two jazz awards for collaborations with late pianist **Chick Corea**;

bluegrass musicians **Rob Ickes** and **Trey Hensley** are members of **The Taj Mahal Sextet**, competing for best traditional blues album; Music City's **Cody Fry** snagged an arranging nod for his

orchestral treatment of "The Sound of Silence"; and non-classical producer of the year competitor **Ian Fitchuk** is being celebrated for work that stretches from country's **Kacey Musgraves** to indie pop artist **Still Woozy** and Texan soul vocalist **Leon Bridges**.

Thus, the Grammys reflect the increasing cross-pollination happening in music, a phenomenon that's particularly evident in Nashville and its best-known export: country music.

"We're ushering in a new era," says Cam, who landed a Grammy nomination nine years ago with "Burning House," a song created in 7/4 time. This year, her writing credits make her part of the creative team nominated for Beyonce's album of the year nominee Cowboy Carter. "The boundaries are disappearing and people are mixing. Genres aren't really quite as real as they used to be [or as] people wanted them to be."

The volume of influences and coalescing in Music City was particularly evident when the Recording Academy's Nashville

Chapter held its annual Grammy Nominee Party on Jan. 21 at Loews Vanderbilt Hotel. Country creators rubbed shoulders with peers from Christian music, bluegrass, R&B, Americana,

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classical, pop and heavy metal.

The hodgepodge of styles likely wouldn't surprise listeners paying attention to the tone of mainstream country. Programmed instruments, hip-hop phrasing, crunchy rock power chords and ragged folk/Americana voices are all present in the current brand of country, which has evolved through decades of experimentation in which country adopts sounds and techniques from other genres and from improvements in technology. It's a natural occurrence; every generation's creatives bring their own influence to the party, hoping to build on — and separate themselves from — the music that preceded them.

"Think about how many years luggage didn't have wheels," says producer Julian Bunetta (Thomas Rhett, Kelsea Ballerini), a writer-producer on pop singer Sabrina Carpenter's Grammy-nominated Short n' Sweet. "Then



someone came in and said, 'Hey, what if we make this roll?' And it benefits everybody. So I think it's great, everybody coming in and cross-pollinating in the best way possible."

That hasn't always been the prevailing attitude. Every genre—from jazz to soul—has a share of followers insistent on maintaining purity within their idiom.

"When we were kids, Barry Bales, who plays with Alison Krauss + Union Station, people didn't want the band he was playing with because he had hair down touching his shoulders," says Dan Tyminski, who has collaborated with late EDM star Avicii, but has a best bluegrass album nomination for the

traditional project *Dan Tyminski: Live From the Ryman*. "Bluegrass can be strict if you're on the wrong side of it. But I don't think we have that problem anymore. I think people are pretty widely accepting."

Genres have always been fluid, as leading artists typically push the limits placed upon them. **Elvis Presley** famously blended blues, gospel and country to formulate his groundbreaking sound. **Alabama** pushed country music forward by mixing honky-tonk with Southern rock, while **Jason Aldean** incorporated hard-rock power chords and **Florida Georgia Line** grafted hip-hop influences onto the genre.

Sometimes those artists explode. Often, they do not. But they almost always face skepticism from an industry that, like most businesses, prefers predictability. Musgraves, for example, has at times frustrated her commercial partners while exploring unpredictable territory. In addition to her own nominations this year, Musgraves contributed to the Grammy-nominated Bob Marley: One Love—Music Inspired by the Film, putting a surprisingly folky twist on "Three Little Birds" at the suggestion of songwriter Sarah Buxton. The Recording Academy celebrates Musgraves, and artists like her, in part because their work in the crevasses between the genres is inspiring, but also because it requires a level of courage to explore outside the accepted confines.

"The problem is all the genres are so set," Fleck says. "I know they need to be. [If] somebody says, 'Hey, I like stuff like this,' well, 'Here's the genre—you can go find more of it.' I understand the marketing aspect of it, but it's not always the best for the music. People have aspirations outside of their genre, and they get ghettoized into the genre, and they can't get out."

It is, however, easier than in previous generations to blend genres and still build an audience, thanks to the advent of social media. Fans are better able to skip across formats and less likely to identify with one particular category of music. The artists have a better shot at reaching them.

"All the marketing is in the hands of the artists now," Fry says. "People are fans of the artists, and we have access to so many tools now that offer us ways to connect with fans directly. If fans want to go along on that journey, there's nobody to stop the artist from taking that journey."

The country category on the Grammy ballot thus looks like an eclectic music fan's playlist as Beyoncè and Post Malone compete with the likes of **Lainey Wilson** and **Chris Stapleton**. Traditionalists may balk, but even the artists seem to appreciate the freedom it represents.

"Ithink it's always great for business when you have someone like Beyoncè being nominated," says songwriter **Melody Walker**, up for best American roots song for co-writing **Sierra Ferrell**'s "American Dreaming." "Idon't know if it's fair for her to be competing in Americana, but it's really cool that happened, and I think it's good for us, ultimately, to have that kind of visibility. If she were to win, I think she would be as surprised as anyone, and I think that would spark a conversation." •

New Top 10s For Cody Johnson And Carrie Underwood, Dylan Scott

Cody Johnson and **Carrie Underwood**'s "I'm Gonna Love You" (Cojo/Warner Music Nashville/Capitol Nashville/WMN) climbs three spots to No. 9 on *Billboard*'s Country Airplay chart (dated Feb. 8). It gained by 11% to 17.3 million audience impressions Jan. 24-30, according to Luminate.

The team-up was authored by **Kelly Archer**, **Travis Denning** and **Chris Stevens**. It's from the deluxe version of Johnson's 2023 album, *Leather*, that

was released in November. The set reached No. 5 on Top Country Albums, becoming his fifth top five title.

Johnson, who is from Sebastopol, Texas, adds his fifth Country Airplay top 10. His latest follows "Dirt Cheap," which reached No. 5 in September; "The Painter" (No. 1 for one week, March); "Human" (No. 8, June 2023); and "'Til You Can't"



(No. 1, two weeks, March-April 2022).

Underwood earns her 31st Country Airplay top 10 and first since "Ghost Story," which peaked at No. 6 in October 2022. In between, she banked two top 20 hits: "Out of That Truck" (No. 18, April) and "Hate My Heart" (No. 20, May 2023). She notched her 16th and most recent No. 1 with "If I Didn't Love You," with Jason Aldean, for three weeks in October-November 2021. She boasts the second-most such top 10s among women dating to the chart's 1990 launch. Reba McEntire leads the category, with 37.

'GOOD' NEWS Dylan Scott scores his seventh Country Airplay top 10, and his fifth in succession, as "This Town's Been Too Good to Us" (Curb), which he cowrote, lifts 11-10 (17 million, up 9%). Meanwhile, he claims concurrent top 10s for the first time as "Boys Back Home," with Dylan Marlowe, ranks at No. 6 after reaching No. 2. Scott's top 10 streak is rounded out by "Can't Have Mine," which led for one week in December 2023, becoming his third No. 1; "New Truck" (No. 1, one week, August 2022); and "Nobody" (No. 2, June 2021). ●

COUNTRY AIRPLAY CHART LEGEND

RANKINGS

Country Airplay is ranked by total audience impressions for the week ending Sunday based on monitored airplay by Mediabase of 145 stations by Luminate. Audience totals on the chart are derived, in part, using certain Nielsen Audio-copyrighted Persons 12+ audience estimates (under license © 2025, Nielsen Audio). The list of all Country Airplay chart reporters can be viewed in Luminate's online platform.

TIES

On Country Airplay, if two songs are tied in audience, the song with the larger increase in audience is placed first.

BULLETS

Awarded on Country Airplay to titles gaining audience or remaining flat from the previous week. A song will also receive a bullet if its percentage loss in audience does not exceed the percentage of monitored station downtime for the format. Titles that decline in audience but increase in detections will also receive a bullet if the total audience erosion for the week does not exceed 3%.

RECURRENTS

On Country Airplay, descending titles below No. 10 in either audience or detections are moved to recurrent after 20 weeks, provided that they are not still gaining enough audience points to bullet or if they rank below No. 10 and post a third consecutive week of (non-bulleted) audience decline, regardless of total chart weeks. Plus, songs that ascend to a peak between Nos. 1 and 5 will remain on the chart for one additional week even if dropping below No. 10.

HOT SHOT DEBUT

Awarded to the highest-ranking new entry on Country Airplay.

MOST INCREASED AUDIENCE

Most Increased Audience on Country Airplay lists the songs with the greatest week-to-week increases in total audience.

AIRPOWER

Awarded on Country Airplay to titles ranking inside top 20 in plays and audience rankings for the first time, with increases in both plays and audience.

BREAKER

Awarded on Country Airplay to titles achieving airplay (at least one detection) at 60% of reporting stations for the first time.

WARNER CHAPPELL'S BEN VAUGHN DIES

Warner Chappell Nashville president/CEO **Ben Vaughn**, 49, died Jan. 30. A cause of death was not disclosed.

The much-beloved Vaughn, who was *Billboard*'s 2020 Country Power Players executive of the year, joined WCN in 2012. He was promoted to president in 2017 and added the role of CEO in 2019. The Belmont University alum was honored with Belmont's Music City Milestone Award in 2015.

Under Vaughn, WCN has consistently dominated the country music publishing market. In 2024, it was crowned ASCAP Country Music and BMI Publisher of the Year for the fifth time and marked its third consecutive quarter at No. 1 on Billboard's Country Airplay publisher rankings. Apart from third-quarter 2022 to third-quarter 2023, WCN was No. 1 on the rankings every quarter except two since the beginning of 2017.

Among the songwriters Vaughn worked with were Thomas Rhett, Zach Bryan, Chris Stapleton, Riley Green, Warren Zeiders, Hunter Phelps, Bailey Zimmerman, Jessi Alexander, Liz Rose, Josh Phillips and Nicolle Galyon.

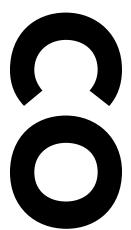

55 Years Ago Tom T. Hall Locked Up 'A Week' At No. 1

In 1970, the artist nicknamed "The Storyteller" earned his first Hot Country Songs leader On Jan. 31, 1970, **Tom T. Hall**'s "A Week in a Country Jail" began a two-week sentence atop *Billboard*'s Hot Country Songs chart.

The track, which Hall wrote, chronicles his arrest for speeding in Paintsville, Ky. It was produced by **Jerry Kennedy**.

Hall was born May 25, 1936, in Olive Hill, Ky. He gravitated to country and bluegrass music early on, and, after enlisting in the U.S. Army in 1957, he performed over the Armed Forces Radio Network while serving in Germany. Following his discharge, he moved to Nashville in 1964.

"Jail" was the first of seven Hot Country Songs No. 1s among 21 top 10s for Hall, who was nicknamed "The Storyteller." He also penned multiple hits for other artists, including 1968's Hot Country Songs and Billboard Hot 100 No. 1 "Harper Valley P.T.A." by Jeannie C. Riley.

Hall's prolific career led to his inductions into the Country Music Hall of Fame (2008), the Bluegrass Hall of Fame (2018) and the Songwriters Hall of Fame (2019). He died on Aug. 20, 2021, from a self-inflicted gunshot wound at his home in Franklin, Tenn.
