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Chris Stapleton Hands Off Hardware In A New, All-American Road-Show Tradition

—or, more accurately, a passing of the road case —as Combs' crew took control of a trophy that **Chris Stapleton** had carted around the country and across the Atlantic during 2024.

Last year marked the first time that the Country Music Association honored an entire crew, and Team Stapleton decided during a post-awards celebration to take the award out where it had been won: on the stages, on the highways and in the back of semi-trucks that took the All-American Road Show from Nashville to the people.

The trophy was unloaded at every venue and placed somewhere on, or near, the stage as a reminder to all of Stapleton's employees of the reputation they had created. The crew of the year hardware visited the Hollywood Bowl in Los Angeles, Bridgestone Arena in Nashville, The O2 in London and the set of NBC's Saturday Night Live in New York, just to pick out a few spots on its itinerary.

"They can never change that," tour manager **Jason Hecht** says. "We're always the first name on the trophy. For us, that's a very cool thing, and to get to carry it around, and hopefully set a little bit of a precedent, that was definitely a really big sense of pride for us."

Stapleton's team had pride in the gig before there was ever a trophy to recognize it. The team had to have been working hard to get that first crew award in a line of work that's grueling at its very foundation.

"A lot of these people are up at 6 a.m., 7 a.m. — first people in the door, and they're not walking out until you've got doors closing, sometimes in the morning with trucks rolling away," says Stapleton's manager, Red Light Management's Clay Hunt. "There's ebbs and flows throughout the day, but this is really long, hard work."

If they do that work correctly, most of the concertgoers won't give a thought to the quasi-miracle that took place in the venue, as a stage was constructed and complicated sound and lighting was installed all on the day of that particular show.

"I always kind of look at it like a sports official, a referee," Hecht says.
"If somebody's saying your name, then something's gone wrong. By definition,

your job is to be in the shadows and to stay out of the way."

The work is likely appreciated most by Stapleton who, along





with his wife/band member, **Morgane Stapleton**, makes it a point to look after their team. She insisted on having a women's bus for the female members of the crew, they remember employees' birthdays with gifts and celebrations, and when several on the team came down with an illness during their recent Australian tour, they didn't even ask about what kind of expenses might be involved in their recovery. They made sure the employees got medical attention, a place to recuperate and plane tickets to catch up to the tour once they had rebounded.

That kind of attentiveness is not surprising for Stapleton. When he left the 2023 Academy of Country Music Awards in Frisco, Texas, he saw the roadies hard at work and picked up a blower to help clean up confetti. He is known, according to his team, to greet the local crew at the end of a show and recognize their role in his success as they prepare to tear it all down.

"I like to play music," Stapleton said when his team won the crew of the year honor. "Everybody [involved] helps me do that every night in ways that would not be possible in any way, shape or form if everybody wasn't at the top of their game."

The CMA rules around the crew of the year trophy don't allow consecutive wins, though individual members of a team can still collect honors. Two Stapleton employees — tour videographer/photographer of the year **Andy Barron** and backline technician of the year **Derek Benitez** — were with Stapleton in Australia and unable to claim their awards in person this year. But the team watched a CMA livestream of the event from Down Under and saw the owner of Stapleton's PR firm, Sacks & Co.'s **Carla Sacks** (who also reps Combs), win publicist of the year. Sacks was visibly emotional.

"I really was very overcome in a way I didn't expect in that room," she allows. "To look out at that community of people that rarely wants, or gets, the spotlight, and then to be recognized by those peers, hit me in a way I wasn't really prepared for."

In the days after his win, Barron kept at the job in Australia and New Zealand, a camera in his hands every day, constantly looking for new angles on the same songs and the same people as he documents Stapleton's work for social media and for posterity. Even as he moves about the arenas and amphitheaters, he's cognizant that after the artist and crew head for the next city, they leave an impression behind them.

"We want every person who's working at the venue—the promoter, everyone involved at the place that is opening their doors up to us—we want them to be excited when we're coming back," Barron says. "We've just always treated every show like that, and everyone on our team has the same mentality."

Mirroring the one-nighters that it represents, the crew of the year trophy moves on after one year to its next recipient, though it will still carry a plaque with Stapleton's name — and the names of each of his team members — as Combs takes it back on the road. In some cases, the award will revisit concert halls where Stapleton carted it in 2024. But it's certain to expand its travels with Combs' entourage.

"We're excited for the Luke Combs team and for them to continue on," Hunt says. "It sounds like they're going to try to carry on the tradition."

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John Morgan Earns First Country Airplay Top 10 With Jason Aldean Collab 'Friends Like That'

John Morgan's "Friends Like That" (Night Train/Broken Bow), featuring **Jason Aldean**, hits the top 10 of *Billboard*'s Country Airplay chart (dated March 15), rising two spots to No. 10.

During the Feb. 28-March 6 tracking week, the single advanced by 6% to 16.8 million audience impressions, according to Luminate.

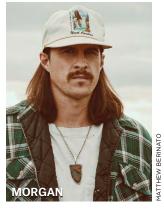
The 29-year-old Morgan, from Sylva, N.C., reaches the Country Airplay top 10 with his first entry as a billed recording artist. He co-wrote it—with **Brent Anderson**, **Will Bundy** and **Lydia Vaughn**—and all six songs on his project *Remember Us?*, released in October 2023.

Morgan has co-penned four other Country Airplay hits, all recorded by Aldean. Two led for three weeks each—"If I Didn't Love You," with Carrie Underwood, in 2021, and "Trouble With a Heartbreak," in 2022

— and "That's What Tequila Does" reached No. 5 in 2023. Fellow current single "Whiskey Drink" (Macon/Broken Bow) jumps 17-14 (12.7 million, up 12%).

Aldean adds his 39th top 10, and first since "Let Your Boys Be Country," which hit No. 3 in July. He first reached the region with the No. 10-peaking "Hicktown" in 2005 and followed with his first of 25 chart-toppers, "Why," in 2006.

JELLY ROLL TIES LONGEST REIGN Jelly Roll's "Liar" (Bailee & Buddy/BMG/Republic/Stoney Creek) dominates Country Airplay for a fourth frame, up 4% to a new weekly best 32.5 million in audience. He matches his longest command, among seven consecutive No. 1s, encompassing all his entries dating to his first in 2022 — "Need a Favor" led for four weeks in 2023. "Liar" is the first song by an artist with no other billed acts to rule for at least four weeks since Shaboozey's "A Bar Song (Tipsy)" ran up a seven-week tab at No. 1 last August-September. ●

RANKINGS

Country Airplay is ranked by total audience impressions for the week ending Sunday based on monitored airplay by Mediabase of 145 stations by Luminate. Audience totals on the chart are derived, in part, using certain Nielsen Audio-copyrighted Persons 12+ audience estimates (under license © 2025, Nielsen Audio). The list of all Country Airplay chart reporters can be viewed in Luminate's online platform.

TIES

On Country Airplay, if two songs are tied in audience, the song with the larger increase in audience is placed first.

BULLETS

Awarded on Country Airplay to titles gaining audience or remaining flat from the previous week. A song will also receive a bullet if its percentage loss in audience does not exceed the percentage of monitored station downtime for the format. Titles that decline in audience but increase in detections will also receive a bullet if the total audience erosion for the week does not exceed 3%.

RECURRENTS

On Country Airplay, descending titles below No. 10 in either audience or detections are moved to recurrent after 20 weeks, provided that they are not still gaining enough audience points to bullet or if they rank below No. 10 and post a third consecutive week of (non-bulleted) audience decline, regardless of total chart weeks. Plus, songs that ascend to a peak between Nos. 1 and 5 will remain on the chart for one additional week even if dropping below No. 10.

HOT SHOT DEBUT

Awarded to the highest-ranking new entry on Country Airplay.

MOST INCREASED AUDIENCE

Most Increased Audience on Country Airplay lists the songs with the greatest week-to-week increases in total audience.

AIRPOWER

Awarded on Country Airplay to titles ranking inside top 20 in plays and audience rankings for the first time, with increases in both plays and audience.

BREAKER

Awarded on Country Airplay to titles achieving airplay (at least one detection) at 60% of reporting stations for the first time.

WOMEN IN MUSIC

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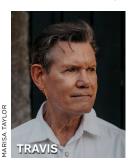

RANDY TRAVIS BIOPIC DUE

Country Music Hall of Famer **Randy Travis**' life and career will be spotlighted in the upcoming biopic *Forever and Ever*, *Amen*, which will also star his fellow country singer **Clay Walker**.

Travis announced the project on March 5 during an appearance at the Grand Ole Opry.

The film is currently being cast by Anne McCarthy, Kellie Roy and Mor-



gan Robbins at Engine Casting; the role of Travis will be portrayed by three actors. Walker will play Travis in his 40s and 50s, while casting is underway for actors to portray him as a child (around 9-12 years old) and at 20-30 years old, according to the press release.

Writer-director **Andrew Hyatt** will direct from his own script, while Travis and his wife, **Mary Travis**, will serve as executive producers alongside Walker.

"We've been approached many times through the years about doing a movie ... but the timing or team has never felt quite as good as it feels right

now," Randy Travis said in a statement. "With Clay on our side and the creative direction he and the producers have, I feel good about telling my story through this medium."

Walker added: "Randy Travis is the voice of a generation and one of the greatest country singers of all time. I am truly honored to be a part of this project and cannot believe I get to play one of my heroes."

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25 Years Ago Lonestar Flashed A Big 'Smile'

In 2000, the group notched its fourth of nine No. 1s on Hot Country Songs

On March 11, 2000, **Lonestar**'s "Smile" beamed atop *Billboard*'s Hot Country Songs chart. It became the band's fourth of nine No. 1 singles.

Keith Follese and Chris Lindsey wrote the song, which Dann Huff produced. It was released from Lonestar's LP Lonely Grill, the group's first of six top 10s on Top Country Albums. The set yielded three other No. 1 songs: "Amazed," "What About Now" and "Tell Her."

With "Amazed," Lonestar achieved its biggest crossover success, as the ballad crowned the all-genre Billboard Hot 100. It also marked the first country leader on the list since Kenny Rogers and Dolly Parton's "Islands in the Stream" in 1983.

Lonestar formed in 1992 with its original lineup of Michael Britt, Richie McDonald, Randy "Keech" Rainwater, John Rich and Dean Sams. Rich left in 1998 and reemerged in 2004 as half of Big & Rich (with Big Kenny Alphin).

Lonestar is still active as a fourman unit, featuring Britt, Rainwater, Sams and lead vocalist **Drew Womack** (formerly of **Sons of the Desert**). Currently touring, the band will next perform on March 12 in North Tonawanda, N.Y. –JIM ASKER
