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BILLBOARD COUNTRY UPDATE

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The Grand Ole Opry Celebrates 100 Years With A Timely Embrace Of The Human Spirit

When host **Blake Shelton** made his first appearance on NBC's *Opry 100: A Live Celebration* on March 19, he hailed it as a "party" honoring the **WSM-AM** Nashville radio show's "good times and great music."

Indeed, one of the objectives of the Opry has always been to make listeners feel so good that they want to return. It's a task that's daunting at times for the genre since its historic role is to represent America's working class, acknowledging the hard life its base faces while conveying hope for something better.

The Opry observed the century mark at a time when cultural forces have put much of blue-collar America on edge. The second Trump administration has spent its first two months threatening economically risky tariffs and using a figurative, erratic chain saw to cut down the federal government. In the process, it has contributed to a sharp decline in the stock market, thrown thousands of capable workers onto unemployment rolls and cut services for the lower- and middle-class while vowing

to renew hefty tax cuts for the wealthy. And, most notably, it has left some fearful that the country's

signature democracy could be sliding toward authoritarian rule. It's hard for a large portion of the TV audience to feel like

partying. Still, the Opry succeeded in its mission, with its current stars paying homage to previous generations. **Reba McEntire** opened the evening with an a cappella take on the **Patsy Cline** classic "Sweet Dreams." **Lainey Wilson** used the late **Hank Williams**' guitar while performing the hard-luck anthem



"Lost Highway" with Marty Stuart. Keith Urban delivered a Crystal-clear acoustic version of "Don't It Make My Brown Eyes Blue" to Crystal Gayle, who was seated next to Bill Anderson in the front row at the Ryman Auditorium. Post Malone and Ashley McBryde covered the rollicking Johnny Cash/June Carter duet "Jackson."

Along the way, Opry 100 delved into the show's 10 decades of history: Its Nov. 28, 1925, debut as *The WSM Barn Dance*; its renaming by founder **George D. Hay**; its 31-year run at the Ryman and its transfer of a symbolic circle of wood from that stage to the Grand Ole Opry House, the show's primary home for 51 years.

The special honed in on some of the key styles that inform the contemporary Opry. Alan Jackson's "Chattahoochee," Clint Black's "Nothin' but the Taillights," Trace Adkins' "(This Ain't No) Thinkin' Thing"

and Shelton's version of the late Joe Diffie's "Pickup Man" emphasized the guitar-driven groove of '90s country. Steven Curtis Chapman, The War and Treaty, Yolanda Adams and Amy Grant took a dramatic side trip to church. And Rhonda Vincent voiced a bluegrass segment that connected the dots



between **Bill Monroe & the Blue Grass Boys**' introduction of the genre 80 years ago and its modern evolution, represented by a haunting performance of "Let Me Touch You for Awhile" from **Alison Krauss & Union Station featuring Jerry Douglas**.

Additionally, *Opry 100* packaged tributes to some of its biggest stars. **Garth Brooks** and **Trisha Yearwood** explored the marital turmoil in the songs of **George Jones** and **Tammy Wynette**, whose six-year marriage ended with a D-I-V-O-R-C-E 50 years ago this March. **Barbara Mandrell** made a rare public appearance, taking a seat onstage as **Kelsea Ballerini** regaled her with Mandrell's 1981 signature "IWas Country When Country Wasn't Cool." And **Dolly Parton** — who noted in a video appearance that she has been an Opry member for 56 years — was honored with **Carly Pearce**'s smoky take on "Jolene" and a group sing-along of "I Will Always Love You" that concluded the night.

A tribute to **Charley Pride** felt particularly important. While the administration has stripped numerous items representing disenfranchised populations from its websites, the Opry brought out **Aloe Blacc** and **The McCrary Sisters** for "Kiss an Angel Good Mornin'."

"That sound broke barriers," Shelton chimed.

The three-hour special gave additional support with repeated glimpses of **Chapel Hart** and **BRELAND**, and several photographs of **DeFord Bailey**.

Still, the most impactful feature was, arguably, the music itself. Producers embraced some of country's most solemn titles, with Brooks covering Jones' funereal "He Stopped Loving Her Today"; **Luke Combs** delivering the Possum's ultra-lonesome abandonment theme, "The Grand Tour"; Krauss and **Brad Paisley** turning in the double-suicide ballad "Whiskey Lullaby"; **Vince Gill** memorializing past stars through "Go Rest High on That Mountain"; and **Eric Church** singing "Why Not Me," a song about the 2017 Las Vegas massacre of 58 concertgoers.

Even some of the uptempo material masked tough topics. McEntire's swampy "The Night the Lights Went Out in Georgia," which she sung with Yearwood, weaves a tale of small-town judicial corruption and an unjust execution. **Dierks Bentley**, **Jamey Johnson** and **Old Crow Medicine Show**'s **Ketch Secor** worked up a sizzling rendition of **The Charlie Daniels Band**'s "The Devil Went Down to Georgia," a tussle between good and evil.

That tug of war is a core value of country music, which vacillates between Saturday-night rabble-rousing and Sunday-morning redemption. Its resilience subtly came through in two performances. **Carrie Underwood** delivered "Three Wooden Crosses," in which a prostitute finds unlikely salvation, while the song's original hit-maker—**Randy Travis**, who survived a brutal 2013 stroke—beamed from the audience. And **Terri Clark** joined McBryde for "Girl Goin' Nowhere," a song of quiet, underdog defiance that encases a bit of the American dream.

The working man is under siege, and *Opry 100* didn't let viewers escape the turmoil. But in showcasing the show's century of diligence and its simple approach to complex emotions, it provided — intentionally or not — a reminder that the little man can still fight back. Or, at least — to quote an old **Ray Price** song title — find "A Way To Survive."

No 'Problem': Morgan Wallen Hits Country Airplay Top 10 With Forthcoming Album's Title Track

Morgan Wallen rolls up his 19th top 10 on *Billboard*'s Country Airplay chart as "I'm the Problem" (Mercury/Republic/Big Loud) rises two spots to No. 9

on the tally dated March 29. It gained by 7% to 19 million audience impressions March 14-20, according to Luminate.

The song follows "Love Somebody," which became Wallen's 16th Country Airplay No. 1, dominating for three weeks in February. "I'm the Problem" is the title song of his album that's due May 16. Two more new songs, "I'm a Little Crazy" and "Just in Case," were released at midnight ET on March 21.



"I have been a problem, for sure, and I've got no problem admitting that," <u>Wallen said</u> in a statement announcing the new LP. "But there are other sides to me as well. I've spent the last 11 months really trying to figure out, 'Do I still want to be the problem? Is it time to move past that phase in my life?' I think it probably is, and this might be the last time I get a chance to honestly say it."

Dating to his initial Country Airplay top 10, which was also his first leader, "Up Down" (featuring **Florida Georgia Line**), in June 2018, Wallen's 19 songs are the second-most to reach the tier, after **Luke Combs**' 20. **Thomas Rhett** ranks third, with 15 top 10s in that span.

SIX-CESS Jelly Roll's "Liar" (Bailee & Buddy/BMG/Republic/Stoney Creek) dominates Country Airplay for a sixth week, all logged back to back (27.4 million, down 12%). It's another new best among his seven total and consecutive leaders, having surpassed his previous longest No. 1 run set by "Need a Favor," which began a four-week penthouse lease in August 2023.

COUNTRY AIRPLAY CHART LEGEND

RANKINGS

Country Airplay is ranked by total audience impressions for the week ending Sunday based on monitored airplay by Mediabase of 145 stations by Luminate. Audience totals on the chart are derived, in part, using certain Nielsen Audio-copyrighted Persons 12+ audience estimates (under license © 2025, Nielsen Audio). The list of all Country Airplay chart reporters can be viewed in Luminate's online platform.

TIES

On Country Airplay, if two songs are tied in audience, the song with the larger increase in audience is placed first.

BULLETS

Awarded on Country Airplay to titles gaining audience or remaining flat from the previous week. A song will also receive a bullet if its percentage loss in audience does not exceed the percentage of monitored station downtime for the format. Titles that decline in audience but increase in detections will also receive a bullet if the total audience erosion for the week does not exceed 3%.

RECURRENTS

On Country Airplay, descending titles below No. 10 in either audience or detections are moved to recurrent after 20 weeks, provided that they are not still gaining enough audience points to bullet or if they rank below No. 10 and post a third consecutive week of (non-bulleted) audience decline, regardless of total chart weeks. Plus, songs that ascend to a peak between Nos. 1 and 5 will remain on the chart for one additional week even if dropping below No. 10.

HOT SHOT DEBUT

Awarded to the highest-ranking new entry on Country Airplay.

MOST INCREASED AUDIENCE

Most Increased Audience on Country Airplay lists the songs with the greatest week-to-week increases in total audience.

AIRPOWER

Awarded on Country Airplay to titles ranking inside top 20 in plays and audience rankings for the first time, with increases in both plays and audience.

BREAKER

Awarded on Country Airplay to titles achieving airplay (at least one detection) at 60% of reporting stations for the first time.

Hosted by **Vince Gill**, the invitation-only press conference will be livestreamed at 10 a.m. CT on the CMA's YouTube Channel <u>here</u>.

The announcement follows CMA efforts on two other continents. The organization took part in the annual C2C: Country to Country Festival, presenting a *CMA Songwriters Series* show on March 13 at indigo at The O2 in London. The concert boasted **Darius Rucker**, **Tucker Wetmore**, **Mickey Guyton**, **Wyatt Flores** and songwriter **Jessi Alexander** ("Light on in the Attic," "I Drive Your Truck").

Additionally, the CMA sponsored a spotlight stage in the London and Glasgow, Scotland, locations of the multicity event. Participating artists included **Bayker** Blankenship, Drew Baldridge, Harper O'Neill, Kaitlin Butts, Kashus Culpepper, Kassi Ashton, Kezia Gill, Max McNown and Willow Avalon.

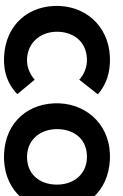

26 Years Ago Kenny Chesney Revved To No. 1 With 'How Forever Feels'

In 1999, the song that shouts out racecar legend Richard Petty began a six-week run in the Hot Country Songs chart's pole position

On March 27, 1999, **Kenny Chesney**'s "How Forever Feels" started a six-week domination on *Billboard*'s Hot Country Songs chart.

The song was authored by **Wendell Mobley** and **Tony Mullins; Buddy Cannon** and **Norro Wilson** produced it. "Hands on the wheel, cruising down the interstate," Chesney sings in the feel-good anthem. "Now I know how **Richard Petty** feels." In addition to the racing legend, **Jimmy Buf-fett** gets an on-brand mention (in praise of "margaritas" and "tanning señoritas").

The track was released as the lead single from Chesney's LP *Everywhere We Go*, which hit No. 5 on Top Country Albums, his highest rank at the time. The superstar has gone on to tally 17 No. 1s, a run that began with his next entry, 2000's *Greatest Hits*. Chesney, who was born March 26, 1968, in Knoxville, Tenn., has banked a record 33 No. 1s on the Country Airplay chart, as well as 23 Hot Country Songs leaders. Known for his major stadium concerts in recent years, he will take a different turn in 2025 by helming a 15-date residency at Las Vegas' Sphere May 22-June 21. —JIM ASKER
