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Celebration, And Calls To Action, At *Billboard* Power Players Event

Country Coda: When Miranda Lambert 'Built' A No. 1 >page 14 It's not every day that a room full of music industry executives keeps quiet during a party.

But at Billboard's annual Country Power Players event, which took place June 4 at Category 10 in Downtown Nashville,

they yielded to a respectful silence as a series of emotional moments highlighted the importance of health initiatives in the business.

Music Health Alliance (MHA) founder Tatum Allsep challenged the industry to help financially in meeting the increasing mental health needs of the creative community as she accepted the Impact award from Brothers Osborne. Billboard country chart manager Jim Asker announced plans to step down from his position on Aug. 15, citing health issues, as Christian artist Lauren Daigle presented him a commemorative Billboard cover plaque. And Little Big Town applied precision harmony to the poignant "Rich Man" as the band accepted the inaugural Ben Vaughn Song Champion award from songwriter Liz Rose ("Girl Crush," "You Belong With Me"). The

honor is named after the former Warner Music Nashville president/CEO, who died in January.

Vaughn "has left an indelible mark on our hearts," LBT's Karen Fairchild said, acknowledging Vaughn's daughter who

was in attendance. "I don't feel at all worthy to talk about your dad other than to just say that we miss him, and I know you do, and we're here for you. You have a community of people here that will stand by you forever. All you do is just reach out

and you tell us what you need, because that's what your dad always did for us."

Hosted by **Reyna Roberts**, the Country Power Players event included a surprise appearance by **Garth Brooks**, who handed the prestigious Executive of the Year trophy to AEG/Goldenvoice executive vp **Stacy Vee**, recognizing her contributions to the Stagecoach festival in Indio, Calif.

Brooks portrayed Vee as an underdog in a male-dominated industry.

"In this business, like so many businesses, a female needs to work 1,000 times harder than a male to get a tenth as much as the male gets," Brooks said. "That's just how it always has been. The blessing on that — I think that's what makes **Dolly Parton**, Dolly Parton. I think that's what — and I was firsthand watching this — makes **Reba McEntire**, Reba McEntire. You can't outwork her,

right? I'm married to one of the greatest singers of any format [Trisha Yearwood]. I watch her every day work 1,000 times harder than me to get a tenth as much as they give me. So with that, I think that kind of describes Stacy."



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BigXthaPlug scored the Innovator award, presented by **Shaboozey** just weeks after topping the Hot Country Songs chart dated April 19 with "All the Way," a rap-country hybrid featuring **Bailey Zimmerman**.

"X is someone who didn't just break the mold," Shaboozey said. "He melted it down and made it his own."



Ella Langley snagged the Trailblazer award, presented by Lainey Wilson, while Riley Green—who collaborated on Langley's "you look like you love me"—was given the Groundbreaker award by Ronnie Dunn, half of duo Brooks & Dunn.

"Any wisdom that has been passed along to me from the women in the business, I've tried to share it with Ella, and Ella seems like she's all ears," Wilson told the crowd. "She wants to listen. She wants to know more and do more and be more, and that's what makes her just a superstar. I'm proud of Ella, not just for being the trailblazing artist that she is,

but for the heart that she's got to go with it."

Asker announced his departure from the *Billboard* charts team while recounting the challenges he has faced as a Stage IV non-Hodgkin's lymphoma survivor.

"They didn't think I'd make it through the first two weeks in the hospital," he recalled.

Asker beat those odds and subsequently ran 15 26.2-mile marathons, raising money for the Leukemia & Lymphoma Society. He expects to continue teaching writing classes at Columbia State Community College in Tennessee and study for another degree.

MHA, meanwhile, has made assisting cancer patients and other members of the music community its nonprofit mission. In the 12 years since its inception, the organization has reportedly benefited more than 32,000 people and saved the industry over \$145 million in health-care costs. That's particularly noteworthy, as the majority of music-industry workers are independently contracted and historically face greater difficulty accessing insurance than corporate-employed staff.

T.J. Osborne hailed Allsep as "Nashville's very own **Mother Teresa**." Allsep, in turn, sought to motivate the movers and shakers in the room to step up their game during an increasingly difficult emotional period.

"In the last few months, MHA has seen a 250% increase in requests for mental health support," Allsep said. "Y'all, that's not a statistic. That's a screaming flare. It is a fucking SOS call, and we have got to do better.

"We've got to have a plan for the long haul," she continued. "We know that music heals, but even the healers need healing. So here's the ask to every label, to every publisher, to every platform, to every artist, everybody who makes a living in this industry: Please don't just admire the mission and the impact. Feel it. Fuel it. Fund it. We so desperately need you to stand with us, to nurture the noise, and then we can truly heal the music."

More Morgan: 'I'm the Problem' Tops Country Airplay For Eighth Week, 'Just In Case' Becomes His 20th Top 10

Morgan Wallen's "I'm the Problem" (Mercury/Republic/Big Loud) leads *Billboard*'s Country Airplay chart for an eighth total and consecutive week.

It holds atop the June 14-dated list with 27.1 million audience impressions (down 9%) May 30-June 5, according to Luminate.

Concurrently, "Just in Case," the Sneedville, Tenn., native's latest single being worked to country radio, gives Wallen his 20th Country Airplay top 10 — 17 of which have hit No. 1. It rises 11-10 with a 10% advance to 17.7 million in reach. Plus, Wallen's "I Ain't Coming Back," featuring **Post Malone**, ranks at its No. 32 high (2.9 million, up 5%).

"I'm the Problem" is the third Country Airplay No. 1 and title track from Wallen's new album, which opened atop the Billboard 200 and

Top Country Albums (dated May 31) with 2025's largest week by equivalent album units: 493,000 in the United States.

Since the Country Airplay chart launched in January 1990, "I'm the Problem" is just the sixth hit to dominate for eight or more weeks — and Wallen owns three of them, as his latest joins "You Proof" (10 weeks at No. 1 beginning in October 2022) and "Last Night" (eight weeks, 2023). The other three such supremacies: Nate Smith's "World on Fire" (10 weeks, 2023-24), Alan Jackson and Jimmy Buffett's "It's Five O' Clock Somewhere" (eight, 2003) and Lonestar's "Amazed" (eight, 1999).

Meanwhile, Wallen ties **Luke Combs** for the most Country Airplay top 10s dating to the former's first week in the tier. On the May 12, 2018, chart, "Up Down" (featuring **Florida Georgia Line**) reached the region on its way to No. 1. (Combs boasts 22 total top 10s, having notched his first two in 2017.) **●**

RANKINGS

Country Airplay is ranked by total audience impressions for the week ending Sunday based on monitored airplay by Mediabase of 145 stations by Luminate. Audience totals on the chart are derived, in part, using certain Nielsen Audio-copyrighted Persons 12+ audience estimates (under license © 2025, Nielsen Audio). The list of all Country Airplay chart reporters can be viewed in Luminate's online platform.

TIES

On Country Airplay, if two songs are tied in audience, the song with the larger increase in audience is placed first.

BULLETS

Awarded on Country Airplay to titles gaining audience or remaining flat from the previous week. A song will also receive a bullet if its percentage loss in audience does not exceed the percentage of monitored station downtime for the format. Titles that decline in audience but increase in detections will also receive a bullet if the total audience erosion for the week does not exceed 3%.

RECURRENTS

On Country Airplay, descending titles below No. 10 in either audience or detections are moved to recurrent after 20 weeks, provided that they are not still gaining enough audience points to bullet or if they rank below No. 10 and post a third consecutive week of (non-bulleted) audience decline, regardless of total chart weeks. Plus, songs that ascend to a peak between Nos. 1 and 5 will remain on the chart for one additional week even if dropping below No. 10.

HOT SHOT DEBUT

Awarded to the highest-ranking new entry on Country Airplay.

MOST INCREASED AUDIENCE

Most Increased Audience on Country Airplay lists the songs with the greatest week-to-week increases in total audience.

AIRPOWER

Awarded on Country Airplay to titles ranking inside top 20 in plays and audience rankings for the first time, with increases in both plays and audience.

BREAKER

Awarded on Country Airplay to titles achieving airplay (at least one detection) at 60% of reporting stations for the first time.

CMA FEST OPENS IN NASHVILLE

The Country Music Association's annual CMA Fest got underway June 5 with a few wrinkles.

Jason Aldean closed the opening night's Nissan Stadium show in fairly typical fashion after midnight, but fans had to make parking adjustments as the city works to replace the event's primary venue. A stadium is being built next to Nissan, chewing up thousands of parking spaces. Surprisingly, parking was still accessible at Music City Center downtown, suggesting that an increasing number of attendees are using rideshare options for their commute.

One new development was apparent at the start of the day. Steel fencing at the Riverfront stage was positioned in snakelike fashion, different from previous years. Slow-moving fan groups clogged the path, and it took a half hour just to enter the venue. As a result, those who arrived at the gate 10 minutes before **Megan Moroney**'s opening performance only got to see her final number. Foot traffic moved more smoothly later in the day.

A Fan Alley is set up for the first time along First Avenue, connecting Riverfront with the Dr Pepper Amp Stage near Ascend Amphitheater. That street was used in previous years as a hub for back-end services, including emergency vehicles, and made the path something of an undeveloped desert for fans. With this year's shift, the Alley features food trucks, a Wild Turkey mechanical bull ride and concessions, including an Idahoan Potatoes giveaway of mashed potatoes.

CMA is presenting artists making their festival debut pins. Roughly 70 acts are making their inaugural appearances, including **Preston Cooper**, whose set at the Good Molecules Reverb Stage featured an angsty cover of **Gavin De-Graw**'s "I Don't Wanna Be."

The daytime stages were loaded with covers, including Liam St. John's inventive version of Britney Spears' "Toxic," Lauren Watkins' easygoing take on Aldean's "Amarillo Sky," Kylie Morgan's medley of Gwen Stefani titles and Mae Estes' unlikely mashup of Vince Gill's "Liza Jane" and the Jessie J/Ariana Grande/Nicki Minaj pop hit "Bang Bang."

Musically Fed returned this year to continue repurposing unused backstage catering to assist local food programs.

Ashley McBryde and **Cody Johnson** have been named co-hosts of the three-hour ABC CMA Fest special, set to air June 26.

The 2026 festival has already been scheduled for June 4-7.



Miranda Lambert Found A Home At No. 1

In 2010, ballad "The House That Built Me" became the singer-songwriter's first Hot Country Songs leader

On June 12, 2010, Miranda Lambert's "The House That Built Me" started a four-week reign on *Billboard*'s Hot Country Songs chart, becoming her first of five career No. 1s.

The ballad was co-written by **Tom Douglas** and **Allen Shamblin** and coproduced by **Frank Liddell** and **Mike Wrucke**. It appeared on Lambert's *Revolution*, which debuted at No. 1 on Top

Country Albums, marking her third of seven straight career-opening, and total, No. 1s.

The nostalgic composition finds Lambert looking back on her childhood home and its legacy and earned her the Grammy Award for best female country vocal performance in 2011.

Lambert was born in Longview, Texas, on Nov. 10, 1983, and came to prominence after finishing third on the USA Network's talent show Nashville Star in 2003. The seven-time winner of the Country Music Association's female vocalist of the year award signed to Big Loud in partnership with Republic Records in April 2024. Her latest album, Postcards From Texas, released last September, opened at its No. 8 high on Top Country Albums.
